Reception

Reception have spent this term increasing their repertoire of songs and rhymes to explore pulse. The children can now find the pulse in a familiar piece of music and show it through moving their bodies.

Year 1

Year 1 have also been increasing their repertoire and can now show the rhythm and the pulse in a piece of music through movement such as throwing a bean bag or shaking a shaker.

Year 2

In Year 2 we have been developing our performance and composition skills. We were hoping to start recorders this term and so we will be sure to do this at the start of Year 3.

Year 4

Year 5 spent the term creating their own bands and either playing their own instrument or learning a new one with help from Miss Heald. We created fanzines to explore a style of music or band which we like.

Year 6

Year 6 started the term exploring Samba music. We wrote songs for the Year 6 teachers to show our appreciation and practised the songs for the show.












Creative and Fun Things to do before you are 12 in...
